For every artist and company performing as part of the 2024 Pleasance Edinburgh Festival Fringe Programme, our commitment is to provide the best possible performance experience - from the quality of our venues and facilities, to the highest levels of support from our team. #### About our approach

The Edinburgh Festival Fringe is a challenging economic environment. As such, the Pleasance is committed to championing sustainable producing practices, that better equip and prepare artists and companies to navigate and understand the financial commitments presenting a show in Edinburgh represents.

The majority of our opportunities are provided on a financing basis (with the Pleasance's contribution recouped last, after core costs and artists fees). We also acknowledge demand for support will far outweigh supply. However, for those companies that want it, we are happy to offer financial advice and support through the festival cycle.

Presenting work at the Festival is expensive and we want companies that come to the Pleasance to grow audiences, develop longer term opportunities and ultimately develop sustainable pathways, therefore reducing their overall risk.

## CHARLIE HARTILL

#### What is it?

The Charlie Hartill Fund supports UK-based theatre makers and comedians in bringing their work to the Edinburgh Festival Fringe.

As Pleasance's flagship fund offering unique and unparalleled support to artists, the fund provides an exceptional package of direct cash investment and mentoring support. The fund seeks to remove financial risk for companies and allow creativity to take centre stage.

The fund was established in 2004 in memory of Charlie Hartill and awards four opportunities each Edinburgh Festival Fringe:

- One for emerging comedians
- One for early career ensemble theatre companies
- Two for UK-based Black, Asian and Global Majority-led theatre shows

## **COMEDY RESERVE**

#### Who is it for?

After a series of try-outs at the Pleasance, four up and coming comics are chosen to perform in a nightly show at the Pleasance, Edinburgh without any financial risk.

To be eligible for our Comedy Reserve you must:

- Be an 'up and coming' comic
- Attend a try-out at the Pleasance, Islington
- Be able to attend the Fringe for the duration of the festival

#### What do you get?

- Guaranteed inclusion within our Festival programme without financial risk
- Accomodation
- Paid subsistence
- Marketing and PR support
- In kind support including (but not limited to): mentoring from the Pleasance Comedy team; rehearsal space, sharing and work space at our London theatre; additional marketing presence as part of our Pleasance Comedy marketing and advertising campaigns

### THEATRE

#### What do you get?

Each year the Charlie Hartill Fund provides one early-career theatre company with the rare and extraordinary opportunity to present a fully produced ensemble performance at the Edinburgh Festival Fringe. The Charlie Hartill Fund also provides financing, mentorship and programming opportunities to support two UKbased Black, Asian and Global Majority artists in bringing an existing show to the Edinburgh Festival Fringe.

The Charlie Hartill Fund offers £10,000 to one early-career theatre company and £5,000 each to two UK-based Black, Asian and Global Majority-led productions towards bringing work to the Fringe. This also includes:

- A guaranteed slot in our Edinburgh programme at Pleasance and programming option in our London transfer run.
- Assistance with accommodation and Travel
- Edinburgh Fringe Registration and brochure fees
- PR and marketing support
- Mentorship
- Rehearsal, development, sharing and work space
- Support to develop and deliver accessible performances

#### Who is it for?

### Eligibility requirements for early-career theatre companies:

- 40% of the entire production and creative team must be no more than 5 years from full time education on the final performance date
- The play must have a performing company of 4 or more cast members
- Directors and producers must not have created more than two professional productions, including Fringe
- Be able to attend the Theatre Try-outs at Pleasance London in February 2024

\*Travel bursaries are available to companies and artists based outside of London.

#### Eligibility requirements for existing UK-based Black, Asian and Global Majority<sup>\*</sup> artists in bringing an existing show to the Edinburgh Festival Fringe:

- Must be based in the United Kingdom
- At least 50% of the lead creators (which could include the Writer, Director, Producer, Designers or makers/devising ensemble) must identify as Black, Asian or Global Majority Artists
- At least 50% of the cast must identify as Global Majority Artists
- Propose an existing Theatre or Children's production to present at Edinburgh Festival Fringe 2024. The show must be tour ready, with a minimum of two public performances staged by the 31st March 2024. We hope to encourage the best work created and presented over the

last year to come to Edinburgh Fringe. We are not looking for new, unstaged work.

- The show must be an Edinburgh Festival Fringe premiere.
- Be able to attend the Selection Interview for 45 minutes with the Pleasance panel on 24th January, 2024 (in person or zoom).

Due to the limitations of our available funding, and to encourage sustainable producing and fair pay, we do not anticipate the cast size for any selected production to exceed 5. This is not a restriction, but shows with larger casts will need to demonstrate additional confirmed or planned fundraising to ensure everyone is paid fairly.

\*We adopt Global Majority as a commonly used term that is consistent with other theatre partners we work with. However, we acknowledge the limitations and lack of nuance of this term, and encourage this to be an opportunity for further discussion. Our definition of 'Global Majority Artists' is inclusive to anyone who experiences racism, or is marginalized or faces barriers within the industry for their race or ethnicity.

Pleasance Producers is a collection of tailored sessions from March - July taking place at Pleasance Islington, designed to prepare everyone coming up to Edinburgh Festival Fringe with Pleasance. Ultimately we want to support you in your journey towards the Fringe and aim for you leave inspired and empowered to take the Festival by storm!

#### Who is it for?

- All companies, artists, comedians and independent producers who are taking show to Edinburgh Fringe, specifically with Pleasance, who feel they would benefit from extra support and advice.

#### What do you get?

- Insight into the responsibilities of producing a show for the Fringe, practical approaches for bringing together and managing a production, as well as being in an open platform to ask questions and discuss your projects
- It will also provide you with the chance to connect directly with Pleasance and meet other producers and theatre makers, building up your network of support for the upcoming Fringe

#### What is it?

The Pleasance is working with six partner theatres across the UK to identify and support exceptional artists and companies local to them, who want to take work to the Festival. Each partner is a leading national producing house, with a commitment to supporting and developing new artists. This programme recognises the extraordinary work being created outside London, and aims to provide tangible support to these companies to present at the Festival. Together, we hope to make a substantial contribution to develop the next generation of leading theatre-makers and companies.

#### - How to Apply

Applications will be opening in January 2024 via partner venues.

#### Who is it for?

Dynamic artists at all stages of their careers. Each partner theatre's submission process will be different, but the primary aim of the scheme remains the same; to uncover and support the best companies and artists from across the UK to present work at the Festival!

#### What do you get?

- £2,000 financing from the Pleasance towards the costs of presenting your show at the Festival, PR support for the show and a marketing package including online & outdoor advertising.
- Guaranteed inclusion within our Festival programme
- Edinburgh Fringe registration fee covered by local partner theatre
- One-week minimum of in-kind rehearsal and development space from local partner theatre
- A programming option in our London transfer run post-Fringe
- Mentorship, support and advice from both local partner theatre and the Pleasance leading up to, and during the Fringe
- Support & funding to develop & deliver accessible performances as part of your run

# YOUNG PLEASANCE

#### What is it?

Each year Young Pleasance creates a company of young aspiring creatives (performers and non-performers). The company specialise in large-scale ensemble work, creating dynamic and original shows with high production values and runs for two weeks at the Fringe. Having staged original productions for the Fringe for the last 25 years, the company has launched the careers of many performers, writers, directors and technicians.

#### Who is it for?

Participants aged 16-21 interested in both on and off-stage theatre roles.

#### What do you get?

The Edinburgh Residential Company gives young performers and backstage crew a professional theatre experience, creating a large-scale production, before and during the largest arts festival in the world.

#### A Womb of One's Own, Wonderbox

What is it?

XYP is an initiative designed to offer emerging theatre makers, previously participants of Young Pleasance, the opportunity to develop a company. We provide the vital and tailored support they need to produce their first piece of work at the Fringe.

#### Who is it for?

Theatre companies where at least 40% of the company must have come directly from our Young Pleasance programmes.

#### What do you get?

- Up to £5,000 financing from the Pleasance towards the cost of presenting your show at the Fringe. This may be used to cover Fringe registration, brochure fees, accommodation, travel expenses and production costs
- Guaranteed inclusion within our Fringe programme
- PR and marketing support as part of our Pleasance Futures campaigns
- Mentorship, support and advice leading up to and during the Fringe
- Rehearsal and development space
- Sharing and work space at our London theatre
- A programming option in our London transfer run post-Fringe
- Support to develop and deliver accessible performances as part of your run

#### What is it?

Following the Fringe in October & November, Pleasance Islington hosts the Best Of Edinburgh season – transferring shows from the Fringe to London.

#### Who is it for?

Any show which has presented at that year's Fringe or a previous festival. Shows don't have to have performed at the Pleasance in Edinburgh.

#### How does it work?

The season is geared toward capitalising on the momentum of the Festival with short runs of 1 to 4 performances. Each evening is double stacked with another show and there is a minimum 45 minute shared turnaround in between. As such, shows need to be easily strikable and turned around quickly similarly to the Fringe.
